Family and Community Medicine in Spain



History:

- 1978 - Declaration of Alma-Ata:

Foundation of the National Commission of Family and Community Medicine.

- 1979 - first residents of Family and Community Medicine (MFyC) specialty start their education within the MIR (Resident Internal Physician) system in Spain.

Family and Community Medicine in Spain



- 17 sanitary systems belonging to each of the autonomous communities with different regulation and service portfolio.
- Loss of Universality
- The assistance activity is computerized: electronic prescription and electronic medical records are imposed as a system of registration in the medical consultation.
- Since 2005, the training in Family and Community Medicine through the MIR system, is extended from 3 to 4 years. However, Family Medicine is not a compulsory subject in all faculties of medicine, and general practitioners are not usually part of the university academic structure.

Family and Community Medicine in Spain



Regular work:

- Patients from 15 years to the end of life. There is primary care paediatrician.
- 1,500,000 patients per doctor approximately
- Opening hours from 8:00 a.m. to 3:00 p.m.
- Average of 40 appointments per day and doctor
- Between 6 to 10 minutes per consultation depending on the autonomous community.
- Doctors work together with the nursing that generally has the same quota as the doctor.
- Community Medicine - talks in institutes and at-risk groups such as seniors, drug addicts, pregnant women ...

Family and Community Medicine in Spain



- **Portfolio of services:**
 - General consultation
 - Home visits
 - Minor surgery
 - Women's Consultation (Contraceptives and follow-up of pregnancy)
 - Ultrasound of AP
 - Spirometry
 - ECG
 - Tonometry's
 - Referrals to specialists

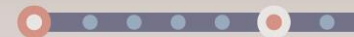
